Make a Stump Garden



Stump gardens were popularised by the Victorians who wanted somewhere to show off their fern collections. Today they are a great way to reuse tree stumps and logs to create a wonderful wildlife habitat.



Spade or garden fork

What you'll need:



Shade-loving plants



Tree stumps, big roots or logs



Mulch/woodchip

How to make your stump garden:



Dig the area over with a fork and remove any weeds.

A stump garden can provide a home for insects, frogs, newts and other wildlife.



Step 2

Dig holes at least three foot deep for the stumps, placing them so that the roots face upwards. You can place them next to one another or keep them separate.



Step 3

Add mulch or woodchip around the stump bases.



Stump gardens can fit into the smallest shady spot in a garden and they look great near a pond.

Step 4

Add shade-loving plants such as ferns, primroses, bluebells, lily of the valley and trailing ivy.

Let moss and lichens grow on the stumps.
